Where and when did it start?

It began on 2 September 1666 and lasted for 4-5 days.

The fire started at 1am on Sunday morning in Thomas Farriner's bakery on Pudding Lane and went on until Thursday.

One-third of London was destroyed and about 100,000 people were made homeless.

Why did the fire spread so quickly?

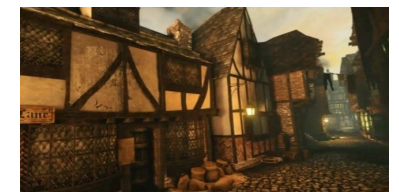
The houses were made from wood and had thatched roofs.
